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

KCC KELLOGG COMMUNITY COLLEGE Early College Program

Early College is a program that enables students to earn a high school diploma and college credits toward a KCC Associate Degree or technical certificate at little to no cost for students or their families.

Why Was Early College Created?

- Make college an affordable option for more students and families;
- Provide a gradual, structured and supported transition from high school to college;
- Create a strong incentive for students to pursue career pathways needed to sustain and grow the local economy;
- Establish a collaborative network between high schools, the community college and local industries to produce a workforce with the technical and employability skills desired by employers.

Who Can Participate?

Early College is available to all interested students that attend districts that currently partner with KCC for Early College. However, there is an intentional focus on those who have traditionally been under served—especially those who are at-risk of not completing high school, are economically disadvantaged or the first in their families to attend college.

How/When Can Students Apply?

Students apply for this program during their sophomore (10th grade) year of high school. If a student is interested in their high school's Early College program, they will need to schedule a meeting with the Early College contact at their high school.

How Does It Work?

Students have to be accepted into their high school's Early College program no later than the first high school count day of their junior (11th grade) year. Depending on the student's high school schedule, they will begin their first college course first semester of the junior year. Here is an example of how many courses an Early College student may enroll in each year:





Software Engineering is the application of engineering to the development of software in a systematic method. Software Engineers use knowledge of engineering principles and programming languages to build software products, develop computer games, and run network control systems.

Students can begin exploring curriculum related to Software Engineering and gain practical experience in the Computer Programming program at the Calhoun Area Career Center.

Computer programming curriculum teaches the core skills needed as a programmer in the most widely used languages. Through elective courses, the student may choose to emphasize additional skills in application use, application programming, networking, or operating systems. KCC offers an Associate Degree in Applied Science in Computer Programming (60-63 credit hours).

A Computer Programmer uses a variety of computer languages such as Java and C++, in order to write software programs. They manipulate the program designs made by engineers and developers into a language that the computer can understand and follow. Some employers have indicated that computer programming graduates with specific skills such as reading, problem solving and mathematics, may have an employment advantage.

Day to Day Tasks

- · Write, update, and maintain computer programs or software packages to handle specific jobs such as tracking inventory, storing or retrieving data, or controlling other equipment
- Conduct trial runs of programs and software applications to ensure desired effect
- · Consult with managerial, engineering, and technical personnel to clarify program intent, identify problems and suggest changes



GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ASSOCIATE DEGREE — An undergraduate academic degree usually earned in two years or more. This can be attained at community college, technical college, vocational school and some universities.

BACHELORS DEGREE — An undergraduate academic degree usually earned in four to seven years. This can be attained at colleges and universities.

CERTIFICATE — A document granted upon the successful completion of a certificate program, typically taking less than two years to complete.

CERTIFICATION EXAM — Often referred to simply as "Certification," this exam assures an individual is qualified to perform a job or task, generally following educational training.

COLLEGE — Any program or training which earns you a degree/credential that can help you find meaningful employment after high school.

CREDIT HOUR — Unit of measuring educational credit, usually based on the number of classroom hours per week throughout a term or semester.

DUAL ENROLLMENT — A student enrolled in high school and at least one college course at the same time.

GRADUATE DEGREE — An advanced academic degree granted after six or more years of studies. This can be attained at university-level graduate programs. Examples include Master's and Doctoral degrees.

HARD SKILLS — Specific, teachable skills that can be defined and measured like reading, math and writing.

INTERNSHIP — On-the-job work experience that is related to your career interests or current field of study, internships can be paid or unpaid.

JOB OUTLOOK — A forecast of the change in the number of people employed in a particular occupation over a set period of time.

LICENSE — Provides permission by a competent authority to engage in a business or occupation.

MEDIAN HOURLY WAGE — Wage estimate between the highest paid 50% and the lowest paid 50% of workers in that occupation; half of the workers in a given occupation earn more than the median wage and half the workers earn less than the median wage.

SOFT SKILLS — Personal characteristics that enable someone to interact effectively with other people. Examples include communication, professionalism, punctuality, attitude, conflict resolution, etc.


